Starting off the six weeks of model railroad activities was a trip to Florida to present 12 onehour clinics over a couple of days at the NMRA Sunshine Region Convention. Thanks to Dave McMullen and his committee team for their work on updating our NCR By-Laws. Also in Fort Wayne we celebrated and congratulated Marshall Stull, NCR Division 1 Superintendent on his selection for the "NMRA Presidents Award".







We had a very active time preparing to make an initial effort to acquaint the model railroad world with our intentions. Byrne Blumenstein, Marshall Stull, Paul Anderson and Barry Hensel put in a great effort to prepare materials to be shown at the Texas convention and to get our website up and running with a lot of content. In addition, Byrne and John Young volunteered to take some of their convention time and man a table with our information and answer questions. Finally, Byrne gave a great speech at the Texas convention Banquet that created a lot of interest in what we intend to do. We owe all of them a big thank you.



convention. Doing it our way saves money and is one factor that will allow us to keep the registration cost low. We have had a bit of a lull since those efforts. But things are moving. We now have commitments from some important organizations that will continue our process of being interesting, and inclusive. A lot of what needs to be done in preparation is to determine all that we will offer, how it all fits in the hotel and how much it will all cost.

The good news is that we have a good handle on how we will fill the hotel. Which rooms will be used for what and when. We have some great ideas about the technology that will be involved.

So, next steps are to finalize those plans for the hotel and to establish a complete budget. In particular, the budget is critical as it will support our decisions on the registration pricing.

I want to reiterate something important. Our priority, beyond putting on a great convention, is not to lose money. Our next most important issue is to understand we are not doing this to make money. Those two items create an interesting balance. As of now I believe we can achieve our registration price goals and still conclude with a reasonable surplus. The next month should solidify all of that.

That is it for now. Be patient. More will be revealed as soon as we are satisfied that we have firm commitments. I will just leave you with the teaser that you will not be disappointed.



ED JOPPICH – Ed passed on Tuesday, Oct 3. He was 91 years old. Ed was born on May 14, 1932, to Katerina and Maximillian Joppich in Detroit, MI. His brothers, Herb (late wife, Rita) and Ray (late wife, Grace), preceded him in death. Ed graduated from St. Mary's of Redford High School and, while a student at the University of Detroit, was drafted into the Army and shipped to Seoul, Korea. As a staff sergeant, he worked closely with the Company Commander, receiving top-secret clearance for 8th Army planning meetings. Upon returning home from the service, Ed and his love, Edee, were married. He is survived by his wife Edee and their 5 children. Ed also had 13 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren!

Ed was an Architect and did many designs in Michigan including UofM, EMU,

Michigan Tech, Wayne State, and the largest mall in Schaumberg, IL. He also did a fine art gallery on a historic site in Northport, St. Scholastica Parish Rectory in Detroit, Benedictine Novitiate in Oxford, MI and worked with the Little Sisters of the Poor to renovate their home for the aged. Ed became acquainted with Monsignor Clem Kern, pastor of Most Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Corktown of Detroit. 2023 NCR ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING NCR REPORT

SECRETARY'S REPORT, NCR MEMBERSHIP ANNUAL MEETING OCTOBER 22, 2023

The Board of Directors of your North Central Region recognized the need to modify our By-Laws and Rule of Operation as they pertain to how elections are conduct for Regional business. The existing process relied exclusively on the publication schedule of the Hot Box for announcements of candidates, elections and ballot distribution. That process is quite cumbersome and out dated in the present world of email access. A committee was created earlier this year lead by Dave McMullian to propose changes to the By-Laws and Rule of Operation. A summary of those changes was emailed to our members in early September for their review and comment. The BOD voted to accept the changes to the Operating Procedures at their meeting in early October, and the membership present voted for the acceptance of the By-Law changes at the membership meeting in conjunction with the Regional convention in Fort Wayne this past month. The changes passed by unanimous acclamation.

The basic changes allow for decoupling the election process from the publication of the HotBox allowing the information to be distributed by email instead. Balloting will also be handled by email distribution. Our hope is to make the whole process less cumbersome and get a greater participation rate in the election process. For the few members we do not have emails for, a paper ballot will be mailed to them.

The other significant change, and one the BOD hopes we won't be using, is to allow the board to simply appoint a person to an open position if they are the only candidate for an open position. This option will only be utilized if none of the races on the ballot have opposition.

These changes will be in effect for the next election cycle in 2024. Election information will be repeated in the HotBox, but may not be as timely. One concern is that we don't have email addresses for a small portion of our membership, but an effort is forth coming to obtain those email addresses. If you know you haven't provided your email address to the Region, please reach out to Marshall Stull to update that information with us.

ELECTRIFYING HUMPYARD PURVEYANCE LEVERS Andy Keeney, Division 5 Superintendent and owner of the Nashville Road, bought Humpyard Purveyance turnout levers for their visual realism on his layout.

These levers were originally designed to function manually through a "choke cable" method of operation. Once these were installed in the yard on his layout Andy was not happy with this arrangement as it caused some


reliability problems. He liked the functionality of Tortoise switch machines. How to combine the two to function together? Andy can always be relied on to toss out a good challenge!

I presented a "proof of concept" design at the last NCR Division 5 meeting. Following is my completed project. By the way, Humpyard Purveyance levers are no longer manufactured although you may find some in the used or new old stock sales on railroad websites.





The first step was to wire the small DPDT switches to operate the Tortoise Switch machines. Switch machines operate by providing DC to the two outer connections on the Tortoise. By reversing the polarity on these two connections you send the Tortoise in the opposite direction. Positions 1 and 2 on the switch are your DC input terminals. To accomplish this you wire your positive lead to terminal 1 and your negative lead to terminal 2. You then connect terminal 1 to terminal 6 and terminal 2 to terminal 5. The output wires to the Tortoise are connected to terminals 3 and 4. Once everything is hooked up, throwing the DPDT switch on way will move the Tortoise in one direction and throwing the switch the other way will redirect the Tortoise in the other direction.




A holding jig was made from a scrap piece of plywood to facilitate soldering. DPDT switches are temporarily mounted with terminal sides up for soldering. We'll step through the process going from left to right.

A) DC wires are stripped then soldered to terminals 1 and 2.

B) Insulation is threaded back onto the wire to prevent shorts.

C) Black wire from terminal 1 is soldered to terminal 6, white wire from terminal 2 is soldered to terminal 5.

D) Green and yellow wires are



soldered to terminals 3 and 4 and will go out to the Tortoise machine.

You end up with power being provided to terminals 1 and 2, reverse capability from terminals 5 and 6, and outputs to the Tortoise on terminals 3 and 4. Due to the smallness of these switches wiring was done on the outside perimeter.

NCR MODELING

Division 5 member Craig Rosenberger did a fine job on the plywood forms I used for this project. My woodshop was not up to the challenge. Humpyard turnout levers are mounted to the plywood form. Levers are numbered to match their locations in the yard.



Plywood was "plowed out" to provide room for wiring. Switches were mounted on 3/8" sticks. Sticks were through drilled to allow wiring to reach barrier strips. Barrier strips (European design) are outputs to Tortoise machines. Black and white bus wires are for DC input to the switches. Connections from the Humpyard levers to the switches was made with .032" piano wire. As the throw of the lever was far greater than the movement of the DPDT switch, and we wanted full movement of the levers, I had to bend the wire such that the wire box around the switch would engage on the top of the switch in one direction and engage the bottom of the switch in the other direction. The white plastic guide was added to prevent the piano wire from fouling the screw heads on the DPDT switches.



This project was designed to allow all work to be done off layout. All that remains is to cut out a 6 ¼" by 7 ¼" hole in the layout and mount this project from underneath and flush with the layout top surface. Provide DC to the outer terminal strip bus and route Tortoise wires to the long terminal strip and the levers will be up and running. The last picture (right above) shows the tower with levers on Andy's layout, down from the massive passenger station complex. Nice!!





NCR HISTORY

RAILROAD CAR FERRIES OF THE LOWER GREAT LAKES – part 2


And as a safety measure, she had a double bottom, an unusual feature on lake ferries. The Ashtabula had a long and relatively uneventful life until the very end. Like most ferries she had her share of scrapes in the crowded harbors and a few encounters with winter ice. Business was good for the Ashtabula up until the depression when revenues fell drastically and her schedule was reduced. World War II brought the expected boom in tonnage carried. After the war revenue fell and fewer trips were made. Dieselization of the Canadian Pacific's lines in Ontario greatly reduced the flow of coal to the north. In 1958 the Ashtabula made only 49 trips.



It seemed that the hard decision to discontinue service was inevitable. But on September 18, 1958 the decision was made. The Ashtabula was involved in the only serious collision of her career and sank. She was approaching her home port when she was struck by the bulk carrier Ben Moreel. Her double hull was of no help in this case. The Ashtabula sank in 27 feet of water. None of the crew were injured and all were taken off safely. With the ferry service losing money there was no alternative but to shut it down. And with that, railroad car ferry operation on the lower Great Lakes came to an end.

TORONTO HAMILTON & BUFFALO NAVIGATION COMPANY

The Pennsylvania-Ontario Transportation Company was, by far, the longest lived of the Lake Erie ferry services. The Toronto Hamilton & Buffalo Navigation Company was the shortest lived. The New York Central Railroad, together with its partner, the Toronto Hamilton & Buffalo, organized the operation. Service began in 1916 between Ashtabula and Port Maitland, Ontario. The major traffic was, as usual, coal northbound. The Central already had an all-rail route to the steel mills in Hamilton, Ontario, but wanted an alternate route to avoid tie-ups at the border as well as to accommodate the increased wartime coal demand.



It was expected that the service would require three ferries. The first, Maitland No.1, above, was completed before the line's port facilities were ready. She was leased in the interim to the Ann Arbor for service on Lake Michigan. The Ann Arbor was so impressed with the Maitland No.1 that they bought her sister, the Maitland No.2, before she was completed. A third sister, to have been named Maitland No.3, was never started and the Toronto Hamilton & Buffalo Navigation Company only operated with one vessel. The Maitland No.1 avoided major disasters during her short career but did run aground near Port Maitland on two occasions. Business for the Toronto Hamilton & Buffalo Navigation Company was never strong and declined sooner than that of the other Lake Erie lines. The Pennsylvania coal fields which originated much of the traffic were in decline by the late 1920s. A new rail water route through Sodus Point, New York, on Lake Ontario, together with the opening of an enlarged Welland Canal in 1932 promised to take much of the Toronto Hamilton & Buffalo's cross lake shipping. Service was suspended on June 28, 1932. The Maitland No.1 was laid up serviceable for a number of years but, in 1942, was requisitioned by the War Shipping Administration.





Her engines were removed for use in other vessels and her hull was cut down to serve as a pulpwood barge. She remained in that service until being sold off the Great Lakes in 1980. She sank in the Atlantic in 1981.

THE ONTARIO CAR FERRY COMPANY, LTD.




The operations of the Ontario Car Ferry Company were quite similar to those of the Lake Erie lines. The primarily traffic was coal northbound, mainly for locomotives. Southbound traffic was somewhat healthier than on the Lake Erie lines but was still only a small fraction of the total. The line was established by the Grand Trunk Railway and the Buffalo Rochester and Pittsburgh Railway and was a Canadian firm, alone among the lake ferry lines, and the ferries sailed under Canadian registry. Operation was between Cobourg, Ontario, and Rochester, New York. Rochester had a much larger population than any of the Lake Erie ports and this provided the expectation of a considerable passenger business, especially during the summer.



Service began in 1907 with one vessel, the Ontario No.1. She was built by the Canadian Shipbuilding Company of Toronto rather than the usual

American builders, as the Welland Canal could not accommodate ships of her size. She had berths for 90 and passenger amenities not found on other Great Lakes ferries. She was also licensed for 1000 deck passengers. Her typical sailing schedule featured a morning passage northbound leaving around 9:00AM with the return the same afternoon. So successful was business that in October, 1915, a second ferry, the Ontario No.2, above, was put in service. By that time Ontario No.1 had made 2000 round trips.



Alone among Great Lakes car ferry lines, the Ontario Car Ferry connected with a regularly scheduled boat train. The BR&P scheduled a train from Rochester to Genesee Dock, above, approximately a half hour before sailing. The train was so successful it ran during the summer months for 33 years. By the 1920s the company had begun to develop tourist traffic, in addition to their day excursion trade. Automobiles were carried on flat cars since there was no convenient road access to their dock. Business was good and in 1929 the ferry company paid dividends of \$75,000 to its two railroad owners. But the depression was hard on the BR&P and it was absorbed by the B&O, as the Grand Trunk had previously been by the Canadian National. Traffic patterns for the Ontario Car Ferry during the wartime and post war periods were similar to those of the Lake Erie companies. From 1945 through 1949 freight tonnage dropped by almost a half with coal tonnage down by two thirds. Passenger traffic also dropped by a half. This trend alone would have doomed the service but then the Canadian government stepped in and settled the matter.

RAILROAD HISTORY

NCR HISTORY

The passenger steamer Noronic had burned at Toronto in 1949 and as a consequence, the government tightened up their inspection standards for passenger vessels. The company judged it would be too costly to bring the 42 year old Ontario No.1 and 34 year old Ontario No.2 into compliance with the new standards given their reduced levels of traffic. The last trip occurred on April 30, 1950 and the two boats were scrapped shortly thereafter. The lower Great Lakes railroad car ferry operations were shorter lived than their Lake Michigan counterparts and much lass known, but I hope you will agree that they were every bit as interesting.

NCR CONVENTION



NEWMAN'S OWN - NEW LAYOUT By John Buckley, Div 4 NCR BUILD


Way back in the Autumn 2022 issue of The Hotbox, I had written an article entitled the 59th Street Spur. It was about my plans to build a small switching layout on a hollow core door. Long story short, after running a few ops sessions, I was discovering that the track plan just wasn't working as I had hoped. So with a bit of hesitation, I removed all of the hand laid track, scraped the wood ties off the door and contemplated what to do next. An empty wall in my workroom gave me the idea. I cut the door in half lengthwise, bought a half dozen long shelf brackets and mounted the door on the wall studs. Success



I used 12" by 12" cork tiles for the roadbed and then covered the tiles with rattle can faux stone paints to give the surface a gravel texture.



Before I go any further, perhaps I should explain where the idea for Newmans Own started. I was looking at various track plans in Model Railroader and saw a couple for Post Cereals Plant here in Michigan. They and Kelloggs are basically neighbors down in Battle Creek.I thought that would make a dandy shelf layout. But I didn't want to just copy the MR plans. So I was eating lunch one day, and had my salad and salad dressing on the table when I happened to glance at the label. Newmans Own. That was the light bulb over my head moment. I drew up several ideas and shared them with friend and fellow modeler Thomas Klimoski and we were able to modify them and come up with something that we felt would work. Once I had gotten the roadbed installed and painted, it was time to start laying track again. And again, I would be hand laying all the track, with the exception of the turnouts. The previous attempts to make my own turnouts was not successful, despite watching numerous how-to videos. I decided that was too frustrating and commercial turnouts would be used. But all the rest would be hand laid.



Some might think that laying down ties and spiking rail is too tedious to be enjoyable. But I felt just the opposite. Using a tie laying jig, I was able to set 2 feet of ties down at a time very quickly. Then once the ties had dried, I gave them a quick coat of rattle can brown paint, sanded the tops to level them out, which also had the added benefit of giving them a bit of weathering, and began the track laying and spiking process. I used a couple of alignment tools, along with one I made myself from basswood and an NMRA track gauge, to make sure the rails stayed true to gauge. I found the spiking went guicker than I thought and was also therapeutic. And there is no greater feeling than sitting back after spiking down 8 to 10 feet of rail, lowering your head down to track level and admiring your handiwork. It took about 2 months to get all the ties, rails and turnouts installed.

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I tested and tested with all different railcars to make sure there are no problems before I even thought about ballasting. I had to tweak a few places because the gauge was either too tight or too loose. That just involved pulling up a spike or two and moving them ever so slightly in or out.



I use the Digitrax DCC system for the shelf layout. The shelf layout uses my old DB150 command station and an MRC power pack. But I have the new UT6 throttle with just a single panel since there is just one locomotive serving Newmans.

Newmans Own Brands uses a variety of railcars. Food grade tank cars for syrups, vegetable oil and sugars, covered hoppers for grains, flour, salt and animal feed, boxcars for receiving glass bottles, cardboard and paper and for shipping palletized food products and reefers for food products that need to be refrigerated. All together, I have 17 car spots on the layout. Not bad for being only a foot wide and just 10-1/2 feet long.






Operations have been exactly as I had hoped. Moving a half dozen cars around the layout takes, sometimes, over an hour. An hour well spent, down in the man cave, with nothing to distract me from letting my imagination run free. I should point out that the structures in the pictures are temporary. What you see in the diagram below is how everything will eventually be laid out. I will start building all the new structures this winter and hope to have everything in place by spring.

INBOUND - Bagged and boxed dry ingredients in Box Cars; Corn Syrup in Tank Cars (corn syrup arrives in different grades, car spot for each grade); GERN in 2 bay Covered Hoppers (GERN is an additive); Packaging material in Box Cars; Produce (apples, blueberries, etc) in Reefer Cars; Sugar and Flour in pressurized and gravity covered hoppers; Vegetable oil in Tank Cars

OUTBOUND - Baked goods in Box Cars and RBLs; Frozen baked goods in Reefer Cars

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS - Any box cars used for shipments of products must be inspected and cleaned before use, so it is first spotted at the car washing and clean-out track before being sent to the shipping warehouse for loading. Each inbound product must be weighed 4 times per month, so a scale is included at the plant. Corn syrup freezes while in transit during the winter months, so it must be thawed before it can be used. The thawing is done outside on the spur with the steam lines and it usually takes 24 hours to thaw an inbound tank car. Once the cars are thawed, they are re-spotted at the proper unloading spot.

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NCR OPS 2023 – B&O Lost Division by Bob Hanna, Div 3 NCR STORY

Ever find that your layout's operations have become routine? Same operators taking the same jobs, and doing them so well and so quickly, that the OP session is over before you know it. It has become routine. Why, you begun to think that this is easy and anybody could do the work. Ever wonder if there is a different way to switch the industries or get the trains over the layout?

Here is a solution for that! Sign up to have your layout open for a NMRA regional convention, Operations signup, or for an Ops weekend. You have just pressed the reset button! You will be getting all new operators, most of whom may have never seen your layout before. Let's see how a new person does on those jobs! I can guarantee that your OP session won't end early! And if you watch, you will see new approaches to operating your layout. I was reminded of something Chuck White told me about an OP session he once signed up for, the regular operator was watching him and said something like "I've seen 100 ways to switch that town, and now I've just seen 101!" But to prevent total chaos, have a few of your regular operators there to help and to answer questions or you'll go nuts. On the layout, it is important to have your towns and industries well labeled. I put a schematic of the tracks and industries at each town on small cards and place them at each town. Cuts down on the questions of "Where is this or that?"

Just had an Ops session for the NCR Convention. Nine people signed up! Two of my regular operators said they would show up to help. (And boy am I glad they did!) We had new people running every job! My regular operator, Fred, helped with Grafton Yard, and Gary helped with Van Doren. Me, I sat down at VJ Tower to help keep the trains on the right tracks. As it is right in the middle of the layout I was close enough to answer questions and to hear any screams from anywhere on the layout.



On the B&O Lost Division Mountain Branch, each town has it's own little, (or big!), switching challenges. Some were handled well. Others, well, we will straighten it out later. The important thing is that we had fun! Every operator thanked me for having an OP session for them to attend. The town of Smith was blocking trains with the switching being done. Had two trains in Jonesville waiting to get through, and one of them had work to do in Jonesville. So we got creative and backed one train up so the other could do his work, and by the time he was done, the track through Smith was clear, except for a train coming down the mountain. Got that train lined into the siding at Jonesville and then the other two trains went on up the mountain.

Of course we had problems. Not being familiar with the layout, it is bound to happen. Rather than creeping up to VJ Tower, more than one train blasted through the junction before the route was lined for them. To be expected, done it myself on other layouts where I was the newbie, so no demerits for the first time. We had an interesting problem with the makeup of one train. The max train length on the mountain is 6 cars, if you want to fit into the sidings and get up the grades. But out of Grafton yard to Van Doren you can have 10 cars. So out of Grafton comes an F9 with 5 hopper cars of coal for the power house at Newburg and 5 empty box cars for the elevator at Jonesville. At Newburg, they switch out the 5 loaded hoppers, but they have to pick up 5 empty cars that need to go to the mines up on the mountain, so which ones are you dropping at Van Doren? Chose to drop the hopper cars and take the 5 empty box cars up to Jonesville Elevator, with the GP7 Helper stationed at Van Doren pushing them up the ruling grade on the layout. (All trains 4 cars or more require a helper from Van Doren to Jonesville.) But once there, the F9 Engineer baulks at hanging out the window while backing all the way down the hill. (The only turntables are at Grafton or Megantown.) So the GP7 helper takes them down to Van Doren and decides to help by bring the 5 empty hoppers back up to the waiting F9. But he stalls on the grade, so the F9 has to back down anyway to help pull them all up to Jonesville.

Needless to say, we did not get all trains ran or all cars delivered. But I saw several different approaches to operating the B&O Lost Division, some of which I plan to try in a regular OP session soon. Plus I got to share my layout with several friends, and made a few more new ones. And we had fun! That was confirmed by the guys who signed up when we got our pay, (pop & cookies), at the end of the session. Try it some time!!

With the "**DIVISION OF CHOICE**" program you can become an official member and even hold office in the division of your liking! All you need to do is fill out the **DIVISION OF CHOICE** form and submit it to the NCR Registrar. Once filed, you can vote and hold office in the division of your choice. Please be aware, the North Central Region (NCR) will notify both divisions of your choice and records will be maintained within the NCR. The NMRA national office WILL NOT change your default division (which is part of your NMRA number). The NCR and your division of choice will honor your selection and provide all the rights of a standard member of that division.


