

First up is our one-day model railroad convention being put on by Division One in the Toledo, OH area on March 23rd! This event will include clinics and layout tours! Second, don't forget to put on your activity calendar, the NCR fall convention being held in Northville, MI on October 10 to 13, 2024. This great convention will be held at the Ward Church facility on 6 Mile Road, just west of Haggerty Road. The planning team is preparing a great event with clinics, layout tours and operating sessions. Look for advertising also in this issue of the Hot Box! Third, the planning team for the NMRA 2025 Convention that will be held in Novi, MI over the dates of July 14 to 19, 2025. MAKING AFFORDABLE HO DWARF SIGNALS

Dwarf signals shown above are on Andy Keeney's Nashville Road's passenger terminal and cost as little as \$1 each to produce.



These signal kits can be bought on Amazon for \$10 for 10 complete kits. Search "HO dwarf signals." The kit comes with red LEDs, green LEDs, dwarf housings and resistors. If you want yellow LEDs, you must buy them. A good place to order them is MPJA.COM. You can pick up one hundred 3mm LEDs for \$1.95. Probably enough LEDs to supply you and all your friends.



If you want your dwarf signals to look especially sharp, you should remove any flash with a hobby knife. Although these signals are molded in black, I would recommend painting them flat black; a spray can will do nicely.




The "dome" of the LED as is, protrudes the front of the dwarf housing and looks unrealistic. I file (or sand) the LED to a flat surface then polish the surface with a fine emery board. I was making a large number of these dwarfs so I set up a jig to sand them fast and accurately.




The next step is to "tin" the leads of the LEDs. We do this by applying liquid flux to the leads, applying a bit of solder to our soldering iron then wiping the solder onto the leads. Before soldering anything make sure that your soldering iron is clean by wiping the hot tip on a clean moist sponge.





All the signals I've seen have red at the bottom and either green or yellow at the top. The long lead is the anode (+ or positive). Take your top (in our case yellow) LED and bend both leads to form a 90-degree bend with the anode at the top.


Do the same with your red LED but have the anode at the bottom. Later on you will be soldering the anode on one LED to the cathode of the other LED. The trick to getting a nicelooking dwarf signal is to get the LED components to nest as flush to the housing as possible. I do this by using a pair of pliers to flatten the leads against the LED package.



Placing the yellow LED in the housing I use a marker to indicate a cut line on the legs of the LED. This assures that the LED will fit within the confines of the housing. I then clip the leads to my mark.



Spread the legs of the yellow LED then reshape them in a bow-legged fashion as shown. This is so that the yellow LED will straddle the sides of the red LED once assembled.







Solder the leads together. You will have the anode to one LED soldered to the cathode of the other LED. Looking at the signal in profile shows how tight the leads are to the assembly.

Liquid electrical tape is available at Home Depot in the electrical department.





Apply the Liquid Tape using a toothpick, "wipe" the toothpick against the brush applicator then spread the liquid from the bottom of the signal to the top. Leave the signal facedown so that the liquid material dries level. Repeat as needed to block any light bleed. Let coats dry completely before reapplication.



Using a 9 volt battery, *making sure you have a 1K resistor inline*, energize the signal. It doesn't matter on which leg you attach the resistor. By connecting the polarity one way you will have a yellow signal. By switching the polarity the other way you will have a red signal. At this point you may also want to check the back of the signal for any light leaks. If you find light leaks apply a little more Liquid Electical Tape using the point of the toothpick. After the assembly is completely dry, spray paint the back of your signal with flat black.

If using a Tortoise switch machine cut one of the power wires leading to your Tortoise and insert this LED. If the signal does not light the color you want then switch the leads. There is no need for a limiting resistor in this application. If using this signal in a stand alone mode you can use a DPDT switch and power it with 12V DC just be sure to have a 1K resistor in line.

IN MEMORIAM NCR STORY

We are sad to report that members in the NCR have been lost. Our deepest sympathies go to the family and friends of our fallen members......

ED BLACK, MMR – Ed passed on December 7, 2023. Ed Black was a Life member and supporter of the NMRA, Division Eight, NCR, and MMR #32. Ed was 94 years old and of sound mind to the end. In the early years before computers and printers Ed hand wrote in calligraphy achievement awards and certificates presented by the NMRA. He never doubted the value of the organization. He was a graduate of Albion College, a member of the Marines, where he played trumpet in the Honor Band, and an owner of Commercial Services until his retirement. He had a passion for boating having owned several boats and piloting one of them in 2000 from Michigan to Florida. He was a world traveler and sightseer, having visited over 55 countries. His greatest passion after retirement was playing jazz trumpet, where he led the Ed Black Jazz Band.

WILLIAM (BILL) NEALE, MMR, age 74, passed away Thursday, December 28th 2023. Bill was born in Toledo, OH, grew-up in Anderson, Indiana and graduated from Purdue University with a bachelor's degree in computer science, a major in math and computer science, and a minor in history. He put all parts of his degree to good use, working for GM, EDS, and HP, while maintaining his love of history through his hobby of modeling trains. His hobby would grow into fulltime fun and a business after retirement as he attained the title of Master Model Railroader (MMR #480) from the National Model Railroad Association. Bill had an extensive HO-scale model railroad in his basement. He was a true artist when it came to locomotive and train car painting and weathering. He loved to share his amazing wealth of knowledge concerning the Pennsylvania Railroad traveling the country giving presentations, publishing articles in model railroad magazines, and serving as the Central District Director of the National Model Railroad Association. He loved to host operating sessions in his basement with other train enthusiasts and loved to help others with their layouts. Bill was a friend to everyone, even strangers, always trying to crack jokes with waitstaff, nurses, and people in line next to him at the grocery.

JOHN "AB9RZ" J REITZ, MMR 77, of Fort Wayne died December 28, 2023. He was a Vietnam veteran of the US Air Force and he retired from Dana after 40 years of service as an Estimator. He was a member of Saint Mary's Catholic Church and was a Fourth Degree Member of the Knights of Columbus. John was a member of the Allen County Amateur Radio Technical Society, Ft. Wayne Radio Club, ARRL, and the National Model Railroad Association. He achieved his MMR designation in 2002, as MMR #316. John was Division 3's first MMR. AB9RZ was his Ham Radio Operator's FCC license number & call sign. John was an avid ham radio operator. John helped resurrect the Northeast Indiana NCR/NMRA Division 3. Except for hosting the NCR convention in 1987, it had been dormant with few members and no activity. Today, the




A HISTORY OF COMBINATION TANK CARS

When railroad construction began in the United States in the 1830s, bulk liquids were shipped in barrels, an inefficient and uneconomical arrangement. By the late 1860s modern tank car designs emerged, with a horizontal tank made of iron. These boiler tank cars, as they were called. solved the technical problems of shipping bulk quantities of liquids by rail, but operational problems remained. Railroads weren't enthused about tank car ownership for a number of reasons. They favored versatile cars that could accommodate a variety of loads while tank cars were suited only to liquids. Tank cars were also "one way" cars that were usually returned empty, an expense the railroads didn't want to bear. And, where the cost of a standard boxcar held steady at about \$500 for much of the late nineteenth century. a tank car could easily cost \$800. Railroads weren't about to pay a hefty premium for cars with such limited utility. The railroads dealt with this situation as they did for other expensive, specialized cars such as refrigerator cars. They didn't buy them, but fobbed the cost off onto private car lines or the shippers themselves.

While this solved the tank car problem for the railroads, it didn't address the cars themselves. But there were plenty of inventors who had ideas on the subject and were more than happy to give their attention to the design of tank cars. Their creations were called combination tank cars. Combination tank cars took two general forms. Some had ordinary box or other type car bodies mounted on a frame with a built-in tank. Others were boxcars with internal tanks as well as general freight compartments. The object of all these designs was to allow the shipment of general freight along with liquids and/or to permit the car to carry a load on the return trip.




Some of the earliest tank car designs were actually for combination box/tank cars. J.F. Keeler's 1865 design is typical of the type. It features a box body mounted on an underframe where part of the tank is slung down between the wheels. Like many combination tank car designs, there is no surviving record of any having been built. One reason for this may be that the inventor had neither the connections in the railroad industry nor the private resources to get his design off the paper and onto the rails.




This was not the case with this design from Horatio G. Brooks, the proprietor of the Brooks Locomotive Works of Dunkirk, New York. Brooks was an industry insider who had the means to construct a car to his own design. The photo below shows the one and only car built to Brooks's patent.




This car was in revenue service for only a very short time. Its story was documented in The Railway Age journal for September 19, 1902. In October, 1876, the car was loaded at Cleveland and dispatched to a customer in San Francisco. But at Council Bluffs, Iowa, the Union Pacific refused to accept the car for interchange. It was returned to Dunkirk and the idea of using such a car was given up. The car languished at the Brooks works for years until the boxcar body was removed and the car used for moving heavy material around the shops until 1902 and possibly later.



A patent issued to A. P. Odell in 1875, two years before Brooks' patent, shows a similar car but with a gondola body. In 1883 the Standard Oil Company purchased Odell's patent rights for a few hundred dollars. Within a few years, according to one source, Standard's Union Tank Line (UTL) subsidiary operated a fleet of 500 of them in the west coast trade. They returned with lumber loads, thus saving Standard Oil the \$105 the western railroads charged for each empty tank car back haul. At this time California was a strong market for petroleum products. It was known that California had large oil reserves but they hadn't yet been developed. When they were, there would no longer be a need to ship products from the east. The Odell cars, then, were a stopgap measure until the west coast achieved petroleum self-sufficiency.







The patent shown above, issued to M. C. brown in 1879, shows a different kind of combination tank car. In this design, a pair of tanks is housed in a conventional boxcar body. They are separated from the central freight space by partitions that can be removed to perform maintenance on the tanks. Each tank has a filler that is accessed through a hatch in the roof. The photo below, from the collection of the Denver Public Library, shows a UTL car in a Pueblo, Colorado freight yard that appears to be built to Brown's patent.




It seems likely that UTL, as the largest operator of tank cars in the country, would also be the largest operator of combination tank cars. But, how many of these cars did UTL have? In the June, 1891, Official Railway Equipment Register (ORER), UTL has 200 combination box and tank cars, numbers 1001 to 1200, listed. No combination gondolas are shown, so the Odell cars must have outlived their usefulness by then. But the UTL entry from the August, 1910 ORER shows no combination tank cars. What happened to them? Probably, most were scrapped, but three were purchased by the California Western Railroad & Navigation Company.



CWR&N No.400 shows the same small side ventilators as UTL No.1033.



CWR&N No.7, with the boxcar body removed, reveals two horizontal tanks. And it is slightly swaybacked in spite of having very heavy side sills.



C. L. Rogers' 1897 patent shows a similar car but with cylindrical tanks standing on end, each having a dome protruding out of the roof and enclosed in a cupola. This patent is not for a combination tank car as such, but for an improvement to the "ordinary" type of combination tank car. In Rogers' design the tank can be shifted away from the car end to allow access to the bolts that attach the draft timbers to the car's center sills. Without Rogers' improvement it would be a major job to replace the draft timbers in the event of damage to them from a wreck, or even from rough switching. But with Rogers' improvement it is a simple matter to remove the freight compartment partition and shift the tank, once it's empty, of course! Rogers' patent was assigned to car builder Murray, Dougal and Company of Milton, Pennsylvania who produced a "Standard Combination Box and Tank Car for Pacific Coast Trade". Here is a brief look at some examples of this type of combination tank car.



The long cupolas show Pennsylvania & Delaware Oil Company No.119 to have been built to C.L. Rogers' patent.



Bear Creek Star Line No.16 is an unusual variant on the tank-inside-a-boxcar type of combination tank car. Here the tank is in the center with a small freight compartment at each end of the car. It's hard to imagine the purpose of this feature since it seems to put the heavy tank in the worst possible location relative to the car's structure.



Arctic Oil Works No.502 is not a Rogers patent car as can be seen by the short roof cupolas. The Arctic Oil Works entry in the June, 1896 ORER, shows that the company owned twelve similar cars. Arctic Oil works was a dealer in whale oil.

This survey of combination tank cars can be ended by answering two questions about their place in American railroad history. First, why were they designed? They were designed to fill the short term need for a tank car for transcontinental service that could return east with a load. When the California petroleum industry developed sufficient capacity to meet the needs of the west coast, combination tank cars were no longer needed. And second, how many combination tank cars were built during this short window of their popularity? The largest user of combination tank cars, by far, was Union Tank Line. A look at their ORER listings shows no more than a thousand combination cars including both Odell gondola/tank cars and various types of box/tank cars. All the other users of combination tank cars seem to have had small fleets of them, amounting, in total, to perhaps not more than a hundred of them, at a guess. With such a small number built, it's no wonder that combination tank cars remain an obscure, but fascinating, side note on the American railroad scene.



3D PRINTING FOR MODEL RAILROADING

NCR MODELING

This article will discuss some of the basics of 3D printing and how it can help you in your model railroading! Some of the things we'll be looking at include - Why? - CAD programs - How to Design parts - Printers and costs. While I am no expert, I have had 3D printing done to make parts needed for builds. It's relativity easy and fun! Let's take a look..... WHY? 3D printing can be used for special projects, parts that are needed and not made and repetition. Here is one example of special parts that are needed for a project that are not currently available. Special windows were needed for a roundhouse modification. The model originally had 3 windows but the project called for only two large windows. The roundhouse also had several roof vents on each stall. Instead of cutting tubing and styrene to make vents, it was easier to design and 3D print them. This is where 3D printing does well in repetition of the same part!









To do 3D printing your part must be drawn on a CAD (Computer Aided Design) program. A CAD program allows you to use basic shapes and make them into more complex parts. It then makes a digital file that the 3D printer understands to make that part. FREE CAD programs – TinkerCad, AutoCad Student version, FreeCad, Sketchup Free. Lots of programs are available, each have a training time to learn, try several to see which works best for you.











There are also more advanced programs – Autocad and Solidworks. Some of these must be purchased, but they are so much more powerful than the free programs, giving lots more detail to the models! I have found that TINKERCAD is working well for me, even though I used a professional CAD program (Unix-NX) while working at GM in transmission design. Here are a few items I designed in Tinkercad..... wood pallets, Hershey street lights (non-working) and a coupler pocket for long freight cars (Walthers used to make these).















3D PRINTING FOR MODEL RAILROADING NCR MODELING

As mentioned, I have found I can get decent results using TinkerCad. TinkerCad uses basic shapes to make a part, by adding shapes together or subtracting shapes to get your final design. Here is what TinkerCad looks like when you start a part....



Let's look at how to design and make a part. When you think of a part you want to have printed, think of it's basic shapes. Let's look at an oil barrel.... It's basically a cylinder and some rings!



Another aspect to consider, and an important one, is that filament 3D printers cannot print "in space" (unsupported). By that I mean that overhangs or arms sticking out cannot be printed. Very small overhangs, like the oil drum rings, are possible, but usually there is a 1-5mm size limit.

A pallet sits like this and the cross boards would be "in space" if we tried to print it the way it sits on a floor. Thus, the pallet is printed in this configuration.




Yes, the fork slots are "in space" but are just small enough to be printable.

Another way to get parts is a website called THINGIVERSE. This is a huge deposit of already designed parts. You can download the part file and print it yourself, or have it printed by another source. It is NOT a cad design program, just a repository for already designed parts that are shared freely! https://www.thingiverse.com/
Another way to get parts is to have them printed at a commercial printing service. Shapeways has become the predominate service for 3D printing. You can upload your file, or perhaps someone else has designed the same thing you are looking for. In that case, you simply order the part from Shapeways. You can select color and type of materials. https://www.shapeways.com/

PRINTERS - There are MANY printers on the market! Prices have reduced greatly as time goes on. A very good printer can be purchased for only \$200! This is a printer that will do most anything you need. BUT, better printers also mean better parts! There are also two different type of printers – filament or resin printers. With most printers, objects can be scaled up/down so only one cad file is needed for multiple scaled objects. Filament printers use a plastic "thread" that is feed into the print head to make parts. Many different types of filaments are made including flexible types. PLA is the most commonly used filament today. Filament Printers do very well for most parts. Minimal cleanup is required.

The models featured in this article... pallets, couple pockets, roof vents are all examples of what a filament printer can do.

Resin Printers use a liquid resin that is then fused together to make the part. Resin Printers do better detailing, but are messier to use and maintain. Resin printed parts can also be more brittle, making them more delicate to work with. There is also more clean-up of the parts and the printer itself.







Because a resin printer is quite a bit smaller than a filament printer, the part is printed on an angle and supports are automatically created to support the part during the printing process. Here is an example of resin printed parts..... a current project is to try for my Locomotive AP certificate. You have to scratch-built one loco. As mentioned, 3D printing is allowed, as long as you do the CAD work. Here is an industrial switcher design, all resin 3D printed. Chassis, body, cab roof, long hood top and cab interior.





How do you get the cad file printed? There is a program called CURA. Cura is the world's most popular 3D printing software. Prepare prints with a few clicks, integrate with CAD software for an easier workflow, or dive into custom settings for indepth control. It is the software IN the printer that makes your cad file printable. It allows us to move the project not only every direction, also you can change the size.





Cura slices 3D models. In other words, it translates your 3D printing file (containing a 3D model you drew in CAD software) into G-code. G-code is the language your 3D printer understands, with the sliced file containing print instructions for your 3D printer. Cura is free. Just download it or your printer may already come with it installed.

I am no expert, but have some basic knowledge that I hope you found useful. Don't be scared of 3D printing as I believe it is a great tool for our modeling! Should you invest in a printer? Or is having a service do your printing for you better? It will depend on what you foresee as your printing needs. Have fun and keep modeling!!

He met the love of his life, Judy Haggerty, when they both stood up in their friends' wedding. They were married in 1968 and had three children. The family relocated to Wisconsin when Jim accepted a position with Kalmbach Publishing's Model Railroader Magazine.



Jim worked at the magazine for 43 years, making countless friends and being a pioneer in the model railroading hobby. His helix double decker layout design was one of his crowning achievements. Jim never tired of meeting his fans during train conventions, welcoming visitors in his home to see his train layout, or stopping at all of his favorite hobby shops around the country. Always a quick wit with a wonderful sense of humor, Jim had a way with words. Whether writing his monthly columns, product reviews, or "strongly worded letters" when taking on an injustice, his voice could be heard coming from the page.

Jim was a tireless family man. With three children in sports, Scouts, band, and other activities, he always managed to be in the stands cheering them on. He was the strong and steady type, gently applying mercurochrome to scraped knees, pulling out splinters, and helping with homework and projects whenever needed. He never failed to warn his kids about the "Pewaukee heroes" that liked to give out speeding tickets on the nearby roads as they bounded out the door with keys in hand. He was always so proud of his children and grandchildren, and was quick to tell anyone that would listen about them. Jim will be missed by many. Whenever a train can be heard in the distance or seen rumbling down the tracks, he will be remembered. As Jim steps off this train of life, he leaves behind wonderful memories for his loved ones to cherish.




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BUILD A RIP (REPAIR IN PLACE) TRACK Here are 3 photos of the RIP track I built for my model railroad. All you really need is a track in your yard area that will hold an average freight car. In my case, I picked the service track that ran behind the Coal tower and Sand facility. You will need a crane substantial enough to lift a freight car off its truck on at least one end. This was done by rigging a sling around one end of the car and using the crane to do the lifting.





There are lots of possible variations in design and details. For instance, you could have 2 cranes, one to lift the car and another to lift the trucks. Maybe the 2nd crane is a different type of crane. Maybe the crane and the rigging are both electric. I chose to have a chain fall to move the horizontal position of the lifting hook and just made the operation of the hook electric. Other details could include trash drums, spare trucks or wheelsets, step ladders, sawhorses, lumber, hand tools and some employees hard at work or gold bricking. I added an outhouse nearby. Use your imagination and have fun with it. If you have the space, you could also have 2 tracks as the drawing below shows. The drawing is made to show some of the possible construction details.

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
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


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
