
Word is that we'll also have a one-day event in the Fall of 2022, sponsored/hosted by Div 9 in the Kalamazoo area.



Besides the great layout tours and clinics, there were two changes that were well received and. judging by post-convention surveys, will be regulars at future NCR conventions. Both of them are already planned for next year in Indianapolis. The first was a train yard sale. The sale was open first come no bids, just pay and go. A small percentage of the sale went to the convention. Over \$4,000 was sold to happy attendees. The other very big change was all clinics were presented in the mornings and evenings. This allowed the afternoons open for layout tours and operating sessions, plus prototype tours. This change made for all driving in unfamiliar neighborhoods during the daylight hours. This also meant that at the end of your days' activities you were at your hotel and could finish the day with friends instead of driving back in the dark. A special thanks to Dave McMullian and the convention crew for a very well planned and executed convention.

At the banquet luncheon there was a record 54 AP certificates announced. The NCR also welcomed four new MMR's: Jim Macino, Scott Kramer, Brook Qualman, and James Marquaridt. Any of you that have one AP certificate know that earning seven certificates is a major commitment. Congratulate these four new MMR's when you see them. Of the tens of thousands of modelers over the years that have been NMRA members there are only just over 600 that have achieved the MMR status. Accept the challenge, get out of your comfort zone, and get the modeling done and follow up with the required paperwork. You will be glad you did and learn some new modeling techniques along the way. Yes, COVID did force us to stay in and do some extra modeling. COVID is still with us so continue your modeling and work on your certificates while staving safe.

While I am on the subject of new members, we need them! Our numbers in the NCR and nationally are decreasing every year. Christmas is coming and the trains under the tree is past history, but

could be revived. The grandkids like running our trains, but what about one of their own? Christmas. But, it's a great joy to have him visit and ask... "Pappap, can we run some trains?" on my layout! He even knows how to use the DCC throttle! Well, we did a bit more than that recently. Luke has a play area on my layout and I asked him if he wanted his own siding for a hopper car. We got that done recently and he helped

install it, pounding the cork and track nails in! Here's the before and after pictures of the project. A future model railroader? I certainly hope so! Let's get the kids involved!!





Ernie Barry's East Raton and Santa Fe Railroad represents the Santa Fe's crossing of the Sangre de Cristo mountains (New Mexico) in 1952. Ernie chose that year because of the opportunity to model the transition era when both steam and first-generation diesels were present. *below, left then right-* Reefer block arriving at Raton yard from staging; Raton Engine Service and Caboose Tracks; C&W train at Cokedale; Raton's scratch built coaling tower

So... Once again... Another Reading Modeler on Facebook shows off a truck for his MOW fleet. Jason Miller from Australia showed off an Athearn crane truck he had and added the RDG sign to the truck. Again, I really liked it and while these are not made anymore, I found one on the HO Swap site (former yahoo group, now an io.group) and bought it. I was going to do the same... Just put the decal on it, but also wanted to be just a bit different and paint it blue, inspired by the prototype photo I had of a crane truck.





After starting to paint the truck, I remembered I had a C cab truck that I had traded for, so that one day I could make a model of this truck in the picture. SO... I decided to go full bore! Getting the C cab and cutting that truck frame, then cutting the crane truck frame, I got them glued together. Since this is under the truck, I wasn't worried about the frames looking proper, just so they could be together properly spaced. I made the box behind the cab from scrap styrene and fit it in.





For the bed boxes, instead of trying to craft them from styrene I turned to 3D printing! I took some measurements and using a free program called TinkerCad, I designed the boxes. A good friend with a printer had them done for me in a day and they came out very nice!



After some test fitting and trimming these boxes are near perfect! I'll have to modify the cad models so the trimming will not be necessary and I'm going to design the box behind the cab to be 3D printed as well. If someone else wants to make this truck, I can offer you these three main parts for a very reasonable price!





More pictures of the build progress as painting continues. Yes, I'm brush painting with craft paints, but I think the rough look will be OK. It will make the truck look well used.





Almost done! Have to add some details, the door sign, etc. But I'm pretty happy with the results so far! Also reassembled the box truck using the original crane truck cab. Looks fine too and is back in place on the layout.





With added details, including the RDG MOW sign, here's the finished truck!!



# INDY JUNCTION 2022 – A NEW CONVENTION MODEL FOR A NEW ERA IN CONVENTIONS

Are your bags all packed? Are you ready to go? If so, you're a little early for the next North Central Region Convention. Next year is Indy Junction 2022, scheduled for May 18-22, 2022, in Indianapolis, Indiana - <a href="www.IndyJunction2022.org">www.IndyJunction2022.org</a>. If you're thinking that's not part of the North Central Region, you are absolutely correct. This will be a three-region event, with the Midwest Region, the North Central Region, and the Mid Central Region plus the RPM Conference, formerly known as the Chicagoland RPM (Railroad Prototype Modelers). That means four times the number of clinicians to draw from for some great clinics (<a href="www.indyjunction2022.org/Clinics">www.indyjunction2022.org/Clinics</a>).

During the convention you will have the opportunity to experience the best of an NMRA Regional Convention, an NMRA National Convention, a National Narrow Gauge Convention, and an RPM Conference Meet, all in one location, at a substantially lower cost.



While neither the NMRA National Convention nor the National Narrow Gauge Convention are involved, we are using some of the features of those events for the convention.

The RPM Conference will be participating as an equal partner in the convention. All attendees will be allowed to attend all clinics – NMRA or RPM – at no additional charge. Given that this is a four-day convention, expect at least twice as many clinics and many times the variety of clinics as you'd see at a usual NMRA Region convention. Keep with us in this article and visit the links listed toward the end of this article for all the details.

Clinics? Layout Tours? Operating Sessions? Prototype Tours? Non-Rail Activities? Model Contests? All yes, yes, yes! Plus, a special Friday night "Friends of the Freight Car" dinner organized by the RPM Conference, the opportunity to participate in an Indy Junction 2022 T-TRAK modular layout, a Rail Yard Sale (white elephant), and more.

Layout tours will be during the afternoon – and they're ALL self-driving. You will be able to spend as much time as YOU want at each stop during each layout's available hours. No bus layout tours at this convention and no night-time driving to get to the layouts, either. All clinics that run during layout tour time will be repeated at times when there are no layout tours scheduled.

Like layout tours, most operating sessions are being scheduled for the afternoons. Because of layout owner and crew availability, and conflicts with also hosting layout tours, some operating sessions will be during the evenings. For both layout tours and operating sessions, we have some confirmed and some tentative. # INDY JUNCTION 2022 – A NEW CONVENTION MODEL FOR A NEW ERA IN CONVENTIONS

Included as part of your registration to Indy Junction 2022, at no additional cost to you, is admission to the THREE-day train show on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. When the Train Show opens on Friday, it will be open exclusively to Indy Junction 2022 Convention attendees for several hours. After that time, it will also be open to the public (with an admission charge) for the remainder of the Convention. As an attendee, you will pay nothing additional to have full access to the Train Show all three days. This event will feature as many as 156 exhibitors who will primarily be smaller but well-known manufacturers who will sell direct to you as an attendee during the train show. We will also have several modular layouts setup and running during the show.

We have two confirmed off-site tours available. First is the Whitewater Valley Railroad bus tour on Friday. This is an all-day tour to an excursion railroad that will include a 3-hour round trip train ride and a walk-around visit of the railroad's facilities at the end of the ride. Lunch will be on your own during the 2-hour layover at the turn-around point. The bus tour is limited to 40 participants and will cost \$40.00 per person, not including lunch. The second tour is of the Amtrak Beech Grove repair facility in Indianapolis on Saturday. This extremely rare opportunity tour is limited to only 20 participants. To keep the cost of this tour to an absolute minimum of \$20.00, this is a self-driving tour. The trip from the hotel to the Amtrak facility should take about 15 minutes.

The "Rail Yard Sale" is the new name for the White Elephant Sale or Company Store. This is where you will be able to sell your excess or unwanted model railroad or prototype railroad items and buy someone else's. This sale is totally separate from the train show. For both sellers and buyers, it will be available only to convention attendees. Items must be registered either Wednesday or Thursday with sales on Thursday and Friday. Seller reconciliation will be Saturday with 10% going to Indy Junction 2022. This will be a cash-only event.

Both convention and hotel registration are open now. While these are the basic convention fees, there are additional fare charges for the Friends of the Freight Car Dinner, tours, and the MWTM event:

- \$85.00 Early Registration Opening Registration to December 31, 2021
- \$95.00 Registration January 1, 2022, to April 27, 2022
- \$110.00 Late Registration April 28, 2022, to May 21, 2022
- \$25.00 additional Family Member(s) Registration any date

Indy Junction 2022 is being held at the Indianapolis Marriott East (7202 East 21st St, Indianapolis, IN 46219). This location is away from downtown and away from all Indy 500 Race preparation activities. We've arranged reasonable room rates for Indy Junction 2022 convention attendees. (\$132 per night plus applicable taxes). There's easy access from I-465/I-70. Regardless of what the hotel website shows, Indy Junction 2022 convention attendees will have FREE parking during their stay. Be sure to register for your rooms at the hotel through the link on the Indy Junction 2022 website.

The convention will be a full day longer than most NMRA Regional conventions so that we can get in all the content we will have available for our attendees. With the lower room rate and free parking, it's going to be a LOT less expensive for you to attend this convention than an entire week in a downtown venue at some other model railroad convention next year. Although you won't see a big arch in Indianapolis, spending a few days in late spring will be much more comfortable than being out in the middle of the summer, and for almost everyone in the three host regions, it will be a much shorter drive to get to Indianapolis and to get home.

Four Full Days, Three Regions plus the RPM Conference, Three-Day Train Show, One Convention. What a deal! If you're going to go to just one model railroad convention in 2022 - THIS is the one!

**PULLMAN SLEEPER SERVICE BEFORE THE AUTOMOBILE** continued from the September issue of the HotBox....

C&A #19 (a no-name train) left Chicago at 12:15 AM and arrived at Peoria at 7:00 AM and carried a Pullman sleeper. Chicago to Peoria is only 160 miles, but in 1916 there was no paved roads between these two cities. C&A # 6 (another noname train) left Peoria at 12:01 AM and arrived at Chicago at 7:00 AM and carried a Pullman sleeper.

All of the preceding operation was taking place on almost a daily basis in June 1916 on the Chicago & Alton which was not one of the nation's big railroads. If all of this Pullman sleeper activity was taking place on a small railroad like the C&A, it doesn't require much imagination to visualize the amount of Pullman sleeper activity on larger railroads, such as the NYC, Pennsylvania, B&O, Santa Fe and many others. From that point on, things went downhill in a hurry for the C&A. Each Year, there were more automobiles and better roads. By 1928, you could drive from Chicago to St. Louis or Kansas City in one day.

The through Pullman sleeper that was pulled off of the C&A train and moved to another train at a different station became to expensive for the average small railroad to handle. You could still buy a through ticket (St. Louis to Bay View), but you now had to physically change trains. The number of main line passenger trains on the C&A between Chicago & St. Louis was reduced and the remaining trains on this route carried fewer passengers.

Since the C&A route from Chicago to Kansas City was not a straight line it lost passengers to competing railroads, such as the CB&Q and the Rock Island. In 1928, the C&A took delivery from the St. Louis Car Company of a motor car and trailer with more to follow. This equipment was all that remained in the way of passenger service on the C&A west of the main line between Chicago & Stu Louis.

In the summer of 1941, I got on this doodle-bug train at Ashland, III. The first car was the motor car and baggage, so I got aboard the second car expecting it to be a normal coach. It had coach

seats but to my total surprise it had an open platform observation at the end of the car. This was the first time in my life that I was to ride on an open platform observation car and it was a day in June and all was well with the world. I stayed on that observation platform for the whole 74 miles to Bloomington and except for a few miles, I was the only passenger on the train.

Since all of us grew up with the automobile, we are unable to fully grasp the amount of passenger trains that were running in 1916. Even if you take a railroad fan trip today, the ride is not the same because the equipment is probably 60 years old and equipment that old does not ride or perform as it did when it was younger. It's a shame that the video camera didn't exist in 1916 so some rail fan could have recorded all of that wonderful passenger train travel for us. Don Watson 4-18-94

Division 6 member Don Watson, gave these lessons nearly every month and they always entertained and informed. After Don's passing at the age of 90, his family presented them to Div. 6 and the NCR



Above-This NYC Bay City (Mich.) to Detroit accommodation train carried a New York through sleeper (last car). NYC wasn't all four track main lines and glossy streamliners. J-1 Hudson 5340 stops at Lake Orion, Mich. between Bay City and Detroit at 3.22 PM on June 3, 1949. However, on the rear of this secondary-line local train is a new all-room streamlined sleeping car which will be in Grand Central Terminal tomorrow morning at seven. You can tell from looking at this train that passenger train travel is coming to the end of the line.



Motor 2508 and trailer 2551 were built for the C&A by St. Louis Car Company in 1928. The 2508 later was converted from gas-electric to diesel; its coach section was rebuilt into a baggage compartment. Trailer 2551 had an RPO section and coach seating. When Don Watson rode this train in the summer of 1941, it was in its original form as received by the Chicago & Alton. The C&A merged with the Gulf, Mobile & Ohio in 1945. This photo was taken after the train was rebuilt by the GM&O. Two identical trains were in service until 1960.

Although there were plenty of fast cars and paved roads between Chicago and New York and Boston in 1939, there were no expressways. The big airplanes in 1939 only carried 22 passengers, so the demand for Pullman sleepers between these three big cities was still high.



An eight-car Resort Special photo in 1911. The Pere Marquette Resort Special lasted until the late 30's but continually improving roads in Michigan, finally took away the passengers.



# CURRENT-KEEPER IN EMD NW2 by: Steve Harsh, Div 5 NCR PROJECT

#### INSTALLING A CURRENT-KEEPER IN BLI NW2

I have a BLI Paragon-2 EMD-NW2 switcher that I use for yard work. I wondered if installing a currentkeeper would help avoid occasional stalling of the engine when going through one of the double-slip switches. I searched the Internet with regard to adding a current-keeper to this engine and for the BLI Paragon-2 EMD-SW7. The general consensus was lack of space to install a current-keeper, but it did not appear that anyone actually installed one.

I decided to remove the shell of the engine to have a look. I first removed the two back handrails that go between the shell and the frame. Then looking at the bottom of the engine there are two front and two back tabs. I gently squeezed the shell at the front tabs and slowly pulled up on the shell and it released slightly. Doing the same for the rear tabs and the shell fully released. There is enough slack in the wiring that the shell can be set to the side.

Once inside, I observed there is a fair amount of space above the decoder at the back. Taking a few measurements, it appeared that a TCS KA1 Keep Alive (1.063" x 0.35" x 0.244") might fit and it does. The next issue was locating where to solder the wires of the current-keeper. The information of an excellent site on current-keepers (http://www. members.optusnet.com.au/mainnorth/alive.htm) indicated that I needed to find DC-positive and DCnegative connection points. Many decoders have a "blue-wire" connection point and that would be the DC-positive and the only thing remaining is finding the DC-negative connection. This factory-installed decoder with plug-in connections for everything did not have an apparent "blue-wire" connection point. Therefore, to find the DC-positive and DC-negative connection points will require taking DC voltage measurements using a multi-meter at the bridgerectifier diodes. These are the four square chips located near the large capacitor. There are solder pads at the top and bottom for each of these diodes. These are shown in the photo. It is at these pads that measurements were taken.



With the engine placed on a DCC powered and circuit protected track, I searched for two solder points on the diodes that would supply +12 DC-Volts. Using a trial-and-error approach, I placed the multi-meter probes on different diode pads to eventually find a reading of +12 DC-Volts. Be careful to only touch the diode pads as accidently touching another electrical component could damage the decoder. If I got a zero voltage reading, then both pads are positive or negative. If I had a negative voltage reading, reversing the leads yielded a positive reading. If I got a 6 volts reading, I had found one half of the rectifier circuit. When I got a positive 12 volts reading. I had found the full rectifier circuit. The pad where the positive probe of the multi-meter was located was the DC-positive and the pad where the other probe was located was the DC-negative.

Do not assume that the + terminal of the large capacitor is DC-positive as this only supplies power to the sound system and not to the motor. However, I found that the other terminal of the large capacitor could be used for the DC-negative as it shares a connection to the DC-negative on the diodes. The DC-positive and DC-negative are shown on the photo below. (NOTE: the blue wire has already been attached to the DC-positive connection point)




# CURRENT-KEEPER IN EMD-NW2 By: Steve Harsh, Div 5 NCR PROJECT

Once DC-positive and DC-negative are found, the next task was attaching the blue wire of the Keep Alive to the DC-positive connection point and the black/white stripe wire to the DC-negative connection point. This was not for the faint-of-heart as the working space is small and the connection for DC-positive is tiny. As a point of reference, the component with 680 notation on it is 1/2" wide. Making these connections required me to use a strong headband magnifier and a solder iron with temperature control and small pointed tip. A steady hand is also needed. Realizing that the DC-positive connection would be the most difficult because of its difficult location. I started with that one. I first tinned the connection point on the diode by placing a small drop of liquid flux on the connection point and using the solder iron set to 600-F degrees to tin the connection point using a solder with 4% silver, 56% tin and 40% lead. This tinning should happen quickly. If heat is applied too long it could damage the diode. I then tinned the blue wire. Stripped off 1/4" installation. I tinned the wire with the same solder and then trimmed the tinned wire to 1/8". Using tweezers, I placed the tinned blue wire on the tinned diode and applied heat and the solder of the two quickly melted together to form a strong connection. The connected blue wire is shown in the photo on page 26.

Desiring to know if I have done any damage to the decoder, I placed the engine back on the track and everything still worked. In connecting the black/white stripe wire, I used the same process but it was easier as there was more room to work. Then it was back to track to see if everything still worked and if the Keep Alive was functional.

Everything worked and the Keep Alive kept the engine running for 6-8 inches on a section of non-powered track. The next step was securing the Keep Alive with Kapton tape. The Keep Alive was placed fairly far back to avoid contact with the larger components on the decoder board to avoid overheating issues (see photo below).



The last step was to re-install the shell while being careful to correctly arrange the wires. Once done, I have a much better running engine that does not stall on the switches. I hope you found this installation interesting and useful.

#### EASY LOCO FIX

NCR PROJECT

The latest acquisition for my A&BR RY is this NWSL 2-6-6-2T. Originally built for the Saginaw (Oregon) Lumber Co. as their #4.



The loco has been re-motored, painted, weathered and modified for all wheel pick-up, as shown in the photo below.



Bronze wheel wipers cut from 0.006" sheet were soldered to a PC tie strip that is epoxied to the loco's bottom plate, one for reach set of drivers. A very flexible wire was soldered to each strip along with the wire from the sound decoder. There is also a "keep-alive" circuit installed. The loco runs beautifully and is used where ever big power is needed.
