PRESIDENT'S OBSERVATION

The NMRA is divided into Regions which is further divided into Divisions. The majority of the weekly and monthly activities are organized and lead by the Division officers and members. One of the main functions of the Regional officers is the Annual Regional Convention. While the Divisions rotate the hosting of this convention it is the responsibility of the Regional Board to oversee it each year. Because the membership deserves to attend a convention with some expectations the NCR board created a "Convention Standard Practices" to help with those expectations. When we first started the planning of the Tri-Regional Convention at the Kansas City National in 2018 we looked at National vs Regional Conventions to see what could be reasonably be improved upon. Some of the ideas were tied at the Toledo Convention of 2021 with great reviews. In September there will be an NCR BOD Zoom meeting to review the following Convention standard to see which ones that need to be implemented into our "Standard Practices" for the membership to expect and look forward to each vear at our annual convention. Please review these and let your Division Superintendent know which ones you would like to see regularly at our annual Regional Conventions. Feel free to contact me with any thoughts and ideas you want to express.


1. Schedule the clinics in the morning and evening with the layout tours, op sessions and prototype tours in the afternoon. The main reason for this is so you are not traveling back to your hotel late at night in the dark in unfamiliar areas. As not everyone goes on tours, clinics that can be scheduled for a repeat will be done in the afternoons.

2. Schedule clinics with 30 min between them. This permits time to meet the presenters, other attendees, stop by the rest room and just not be rushed

3. Schedule a Railroad Yard Sale. A silent auction is a logistical hassle even with a computer. The

yard sale has you set your price, anyone wanting the item just pays the price and takes it with them. A percentage goes to the convention and it is done. This was a great success at both Toledo and Indy.

4. While not everyone wants to work on AP Certificates there are multiple opportunities at a



convention for members to earn points. These should be recorded and awarded at the convention with the appropriate documentation presented to these volunteers.

5. It was decided awhile back to switch from a 'contest' to a show presentation at the convention. Based on the number of dwindling entries at our conventions since and the number of contest entries from NCR members at Indy Jnc, I believe it is time to go back to Model Contests at our conventions.

6. Indy Jnc had three Regions and the RPM. The RPM has a policy of awarding their clinic presenters with NO registration fee. So we followed suit for the NMRA clinic presenters. Considering that without clinics there would be no convention this is something to consider. Maybe pay 50% or all for those that agree to give their clinic as a repeat in the afternoon.

The NMRA is a volunteer organization and needs you to volunteer your time and energies. Some of the above will need additional help for your conventions. Remember that one of the AP Certificates is "Volunteer" so get ready and contact your Division officers. Our next convention will be in Ft Wayne in the fall of 2023. See you there...!

I like to take pictures at OP sessions. Sometimes I add captions to them and share them with those in the picture and others. It first started with an OP session at Bill & Steve Rigg's Montana Rail Link model railroad when one operator was having trouble with a derailed car. Another guy kneeled down to help him. Looking at the photo it appeared to me that they were kneeling in prayer, so I added what I thought would be an appropriate caption.



We then got invited to an OP session at the Montpelier club. Again, I took some pictures and using my computer, cropped and added captions to several photos. I take photos at my OP sessions too, where everything does not always go perfectly. Van Doren is one of the busiest towns on the layout and we have a yard master and an assistant working there. They are in charge of getting the Mountain Branch trains across the main line without stopping the main line trains, because the control panel for the electric switches is there. It doesn't always go smoothly and sometimes the switches don't get thrown back for the main line trains until the last minute, or second. So these captions seemed appropriate.







Primary operations are moving iron ore to a plant to make taconite, then moving taconite from ore processing to the Duluth, MN docks to load ships and to a Duluth area steel mill. Other industries relate to the lumber and paper industries. 



NCR ONE DAY (really two!) MODEL RAILROAD CONVENTION - KALAMAZOO/BATTLE CREEK, MI

The NMRA NCR Division 9 is hosting an **NCR ONE DAY Model Railroad Convention** over two days **OCT 28-29, 2022** which will include layout tours, clinics, a special dinner and hopefully some operating session, all of this is over a Friday afternoon through Saturday time frame. The location is in the Kalamazoo and Battle Creek area of Michigan. The Kalamazoo Model Railroad Club will be hosting their annual fall train show and sale on the Sunday (Oct 30) of that weekend if you would like to attend that also. A weekend of railroading activities. Hotel selection in the area is on your own.

The Registration location on Friday will be at the first layout at 3:30pm in Galesburg. You can view the layout and pick up registration related materials. Registration and clinics on Saturday will be at **The River Church**, located at 517 Walbridge, in downtown Kalamazoo. The building is northeast of the Kalamazoo Amtrak Station, and their parking lot backs up to the train tracks.

Oct 28, Friday afternoon, there will be layout open houses from 3:30pm to 6:00pm. You must have a paid registration and convention badge to see the layouts. Registration for the convention will occur at the first layout on the tour.

Oct 28, Friday evening, there will be a gathering of model railroaders for dinner at Clara's Restaurant in downtown Battle Creek starting at 6:30pm. You need to reserve a spot for this event and dinner will be ordered off the menu with individual bills. Who knows what might be scheduled for education, entertainment, and fun!

Oct 29, Saturday, at the River Church, registration from 7:30am to 8:30am and time to visit with other model railroaders. Free refreshments and some breakfast foods during registration and the clinics! Clinic times are-8:30am, 9:45am and 11am. 12 clinics will be presented between four different rooms. Lunch on your own. Then more model railroad layout viewing 1:00pm to 5:00pm, operating sessions on Saturday evening. 11 layouts will be open for viewing on Saturday afternoon.

It was a national caliper event, all in a weekend (4 days). Registrations were over 500 people! With 90 clinics, 51 layout tours, a yard sale room, model display and contest room and a 3 day show/vendor area, it was a complete event. To add to the general success, Indy Junction was also profitable! All Regions and the RPM group benefitted from this event. 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RAILROAD HISTORY



H J Heinz Co. House Car Fleet, 1890s – 1910s

The H J Heinz Company has a long history of shipping its products by rail. In 1888 Henry John Heinz bought out the partners in his small food packing company and reorganized it as the H. J. Heinz Company. It proved to be a very successful venture and soon Heinz offered over 60 products. Heinz served as company president until his death, May 14, 1919.

The company quickly grew to national status. This required long distance transport of Heinz' products as well as goods in process. In the late nineteenth century this could only have been done by rail. At that time farmers would deliver their crops to salting stations located in small towns or rural areas. The brined pickles were then shipped in pickle tank cars to urban plants for further processing. These were the low rectangular cars sometimes referred to as 'coffin' cars. The finished product would be shipped out in house cars. The term 'house car' refers to either refrigerator cars with ice bunkers, or insulated boxcars. Let's take a look at the Heinz house car fleet and some typical Heinz cars.

The Heinz entry from the July 1908 Official Register shows 174 cars of all types. The total number of house cars, listed as refrigerator cars, isn't given. But by subtracting out all of the other cars we get 132 of them. This number varied slightly over the



years but could be considered typical. Some of the cars, lettered HPRL for Heinz Pickle Refrigerator Line, were leased from Armour, one of the largest operators of refrigerator cars at the time.

The Heinz house cars were typical of the time. They were small cars, of all wood construction, 34' in length. All were similar in appearance but varied in details such as style of door sheathing, number of hinges, location of grabirons and corner braces, and style of fascia. But the biggest difference in Heinz cars was between the true refrigerator cars with ice bunkers and roof hatches and the otherwise similar insulated boxcars which lacked these features. The earliest Heinz cars had 5' wheelbase, 20 ton capacity swing motion trucks, a type that gave a smoother ride. Later cars had 25 ton capacity archbar trucks. In 1908 Heinz began using more modern 5'6" wheelbase archbar trucks.

While many photos of Heinz cars survive, one of the biggest unknowns about them is how they were painted. Photos show four different color schemes but the question remains, "What color were they?"



Fortunately one color illustration survives. With its white sides, green roof, and keystone logo on the right, HPRL 317 represents the earliest known Heinz paint scheme. It can be dated by its 1894 Pennsylvania Railroad reweigh date. (The Pennsy served the Heinz main plant in Pittsburgh).



The next Heinz color scheme is a bit more problematic. The car body is dark, but what color is it? At one time this question caused a minor controversy among Heinz railfans and modelers. From 1984 to 1991 there was a very active NMRA Special Interest Group called the Heinz 57 SIG.

The group published a newsletter called Pickles In Miniature (PIM). Members were called Pickles. Pickle Number 1 was Al Westerfield. Al developed his Heinz car kits during this time period and the SIG served as an exchange place for relevant Heinz car information.

The color of the dark cars was a topic of much discussion. There were two schools of thought on this. One school thought they were green. The other believed they were a dark mineral red (aka boxcar red). No definitive Heinz records survive, but each side presented arguments and evidence supporting their position. Al Westerfield was in the group favoring red so that's what he called for in the painting instructions in his kits.



The last Heinz paint scheme from this period is a lighter color, most likely yellow. HJH 484 is a well known example of this paint scheme. Note that this car has ice hatches. It is a true refrigerator car.



The final paint and lettering scheme used by Heinz during this time had a large 57 but was otherwise rather plain. These cars are obviously repaints of earlier cars. On this photo of HJH 496 the outline of the pickle is visible as is lettering on the right side. Note that the doors have been widened and long corner braces as well as straps running the whole length of the side have been added. Maybe these were last gasp band-aids to keep these old cars together for a few more years! While many photos of Heinz cars survive, there are still many unanswered questions about them. Here are a couple of them.



During the time in question large banners were sometimes hung on freight cars carrying noteworthy cargoes. Here is HJH 414. What does it say behind the banner? No one knows for sure but one guess might be, Pure Olive Oil.

Another mystery is, Did Heinz ever advertise different products on opposite sides of the same car? HPFL 3015 advertises Baked Beans. Here is a prototype photo.



But here is another photo of HPFL 3015 advertising Heinz Spaghetti.



Did HPFL 3015 have different lettering on each side? Or did it have different lettering at different times? Nobody knows for sure. Note that this is a later car than the others we have seen. It is one of a group of Mather cars briefly on the Heinz roster in the late teens.



NCR HISTORY

This look at the early Heinz house car fleet will conclude with two views of the Heinz railcar repair facilities located at the main plant in Pittsburgh.



There is no evidence that Heinz built any of its rail cars. However, Heinz did keep them in good repair. House cars were frequently repainted, as we have seen, and their billboards updated. This view shows pickle tank cars and tanks from vinegar cars in a repair yard near the river. These cars were likely high maintenance due to the corrosive nature of their loadings.



This view shows the inside of a shop with a pickle tank car stripped down to its frame. The stencils leaning against the wall would have been used to letter house cars.





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59th STREET SPUR PROJECT John Buckley, Div 4 NC


I have started on a new model railroad project I am calling "7th Street". It's an HO small switching layout built on a 30" by 80" hollow core door that I started planning in early 2022. Since the Johnstown and Maryville is about 90% done (my main layout), I felt like I wanted to create something new. My brother-in-law has a lot of N scale stuff in boxes and I tried to have him part with some of it so I could build an N scale layout on a door. I even looked at several small N scale layouts to get ideas. But he didn't want to give up any of his stuff, and I didn't want to spend a lot of money on N scale track and trains. Thus, I decided to keep it HO, a switching layout on a door, with no curves, just straight track and switches, with 4 to 5 industries and a dozen or so car spots. One 4 axle GP9 and 40' cars would be the perfect size. Here's a couple of screen shots of my plan.




I also made the decision to totally hand lay the entire layout, track and switches, a FIRST for me. I am using Micro Engineering Code 83 rail and wood ties from Fast Tracks. But I am not using the turnout jigs from Fast Tracks. All by hand. I have watched a dozen videos and downloaded articles about how to do it. I feel pretty confident that I can make it happen. But this is going to be a long project. I figure 3 to 4 months to get all the track in place and tested. The industries will all be scratch built by me. Now with summer here in Michigan and my bicycle demanding my attention, I won't be devoting full time to this. However...

Like many model railroads, plans have changed, slightly. In researching the Belt Railway of Chicago, I found an area near BRC's Clearing Yard called 59th Street. While there are technically no industries along that stretch, I liked the sound of the name and used some modelers license. Thus, the name has changed, it's now the **59th Street Spur**. I had purchased a BRC GP9 to go on the J&M since BRC interchanged with Milwaukee Road in Chicago. The J&M is all Milwaukee Road so I figured I could use that locomotive on the new layout.

The plan has changed a little. After struggling with hand laying the first turnout without benefit of any type of jig, I went ahead and bit the bullet and bought one. Makes life much easier. But still hand laying everything. When it's completed, 59th Street will "connect" with the J&M via the 0-5-0 switcher. I'll pull cars off 59th and set them on the incoming track on J&M. Then a J&M switcher will pull them to the yard to be sorted. Process will reverse when cars come from the J&M to 59th Street. Here's the new plan and some pictures of the progress so far.....

THE FLYING GON

Every once in a while, in my duties as an NMRA Achievement Program Assistant, I run across a very special model - something not seen on most model railroads. Recently while visiting with Milt Moore to judge his Master Model Railroader - Cars submission I came across a truly unique model. It is uncommonly referred to as the Flying Gon. We suspect that this unusual piece of equipment may have been created in some strange accident.



Close examination of the Flying Gon reveals that this NEHI Air Line RR vehicle is a combination of a Republic F105 Thunderchief and a railroad gondola. This combination was officially designated the Plane Train Service vehicle. My suspicion is that the Thunderchief pilot came in for a landing on dark and rainy evening and mistook some train tracks for his runway, attempted to land and crashed into a gondola that had been left there by itself. Some young engineer decided that his posed a unique transportation device and decided that if further enhanced, it might become a special service revenue generator; a prime example of not thinking things thru.



Further examination of the Flying Gon reveals the gondola portion of the vehicle has passenger seating, a luggage or freight storage compartment and a swimming pool. You can see that there are a few passengers in the rear seating section and that the seats are equipped with seatbelts. In standard railroad fashion there is a ladder from the passenger section and a walkway over the storagefreight compartment to the forward swimming pool area. You can further see one of the passengers is about to dive into the pool for a refreshing dip.



The Thunderchief's retractable landing gear has obviously been replaced in favor of a set of standard railroad trucks. There are also couplers at both the front and rear of the vehicle; although, I would hate to be coupled onto the rear when the engine is fired up.



Flying the Flying Gon is most likely now out of the question and the gondola section's weight certainly exceeds the lifting capacity of the Thunderchief. Furthermore, the passengers may not like the drafty rear section once airborne. Milt tells us that due to its wide wingspan the Flying Gon has difficulty negotiating tunnels and bridges. It also poses problems with rail traffic in double tracked territory and in yards. Consequently, it has now



been regulated to a remote section of the yard. Our only real concern is that anyone in the pool could be sloshed out and onto the storage section under heavy acceleration.


The Flying Gon was built by Doc Fleming many years ago and presented to Milt in recognition of his "Thumbs" cartoon character's modeling talents (or lack thereof) all in good humor. Many of us older guys remember Thumbs cartoons that appeared every month in the *Bulletin*, as the NMRA magazine was then named. Milt's modeling skills are a whole lot better than Thumbs' skills. Ron King, Joe Kocsis and I decided to judge the Flying Gon along with the eight cars we judged for Milt's AP submission. Out of a possible 125 points, it achieved a score of 134 points! I wonder what Skip Luyk and Frank Koch will think when they see this submission.

PART 2 –

When we left off last issue, I had completed the benchwork and had a plan for 2 sidings for several industries. Now I need curved turnouts for the sidings, so I thought I might try to make them myself (possible AP points!). I went to the Fast Tracks website and you can download/copy turnout templates for free! I found curved turnouts for the radius's I needed, or as close as I could get to it. Just be careful that you print them out IN SCALE!



Here is my attempt to scratch build the needed turnouts! I didn't do too bad, but having problems with the frog area. I have a MMR friend who will help me with the next attempt.



Almost a year later, I never did get with my friend and instead found some used Shinohara turnouts that match my mainline curves pretty close. Buying those, I preceded with their installation.



First was to install the turnout and slightly realign the mainline track. There was quite a height difference between the mainline and where the sidings would be. Too much! Filled that in with some homasote. With the homasote in and some gaps taped shut, I still had the height difference of the cork roadbed. I decided that instead of ramping down the track, I'd simply put the sidings on cork to maintain the track level. First siding is done!

Someone could wonder, why two sidings? Well, it was really needed for the 4 cars that I want to be spotted at this industry. Plus, the plan for the building is that it will be on both sides of the sidings so that all cars can be unloaded/loaded at the same time. The building will go over the tracks and also help hide the mainline coming through the stairs. Now to do the other siding on mainline #2. A month later and we installed the turnout on mainline #2. The tracks aligned well. Then added the turnout control on the other side of mainline #1 where it is more easily accessible. Added in loose ties and we're complete with siding 2.

Here we are, April 2022 now.... Covid has somewhat subsided and some OPS sessions have resumed. And work on the buildings for Danville have started, first with the purchase of 3 DPM bulk modular kits. I started working on the grocery warehouse for Danville, starting with cutting the backdrop and extending the tracks into the stair so more of the cars would be "inside" the building, then on to building walls using DPM wall sections!





Basic structure complete! Thinking of painting it a tan color for something a bit different. OOPS! Mixed dark brown into some fleshtone paint to try to make a more tan color for the warehouse. Well, with the red plastic it came out kinda PINK! Yikes! Stopped by Hobby Lobby and found paint called "SandBox"... Looks like it will be much better!!

Added in some sheet cardboard for the road to the warehouse and small parking lot and sidewalk. A few weeks later, I repainted the parking lot and road approach to a darker gray, looks better.... did some work on the interior, gray wash to weather and make grout lines, roof install/paint and a pipe to help hide a seam. Progress is good! And fun! Also adding pipe details, signs, HVAC and repainted the roof a darker color. Have to get a run of 3D printed roof vents to add too. A week later, started working on some of the scenery around this industry and now it's complete!



The next building is the Hardware Company warehouse. This was going back into the corner and again started with DPM wall sections. However, I decided to make it more old-school, country style with a gable roof! I had some left over roof trusses that were pressed into service.



With the building on an angle to the wall, it took some interesting ways to figure out how the roof would go! Cardboard templates helped greatly!

THE CLOSET EXPANSION

This building came together fairly well and quickly. After having it in place for a few days, I decided that the overhang was a bit too much to not be supported by columns, so I added those in. As you can also see, scenery in the corner was also completed. Those trees help hide the hole through the stairs for the mainlines.



The last building is Thompson Products Co, which is actually a TRW parts plant. Once again, turning to the DPM bulk pack I created a design that filled in the space and will have a curved dock for car loading/unloading. I had an extra Walthers chimney and friends said it looked better with it, so it stays!




Seems one of my new "trademarks" on buildings is to have one door open, so I can detail some inside of the building and so it is with this TRW building. Here's the detailing of the dock.

NCR DIRECTOR REPORT

All things seem to be moving along fine in the NCR and the Division 9 "One Day Convention" planning, so I would like to continue my discussions on designing and presenting clinics and educational programs. In this *HotBox*, I would like to educate you about how adult learners "learn" and how you can incorporate this knowledge into the design and implementation of your presentations and clinics. In the last *HotBox*, I talked about instructors, presentation styles and teaching. We will consider all model railroaders of all ages "adult learners". When "Adult Learners" attend training presentations, they: Want to know information they can put to use right away!; Want to know information that will help move them ahead in their jobs and make more money!;

Need information that will help their family!; Need real information, that will help them be a better person!; Don't have time to waste, they have busy lives and schedules!; Want to "participate" in the training program!; Don't want to be treated like kids!

All learners have "attention spans". This means they can only stay focused on the material you are presenting for so long. Adult learners have busy lives and lots of things going on in their lives, so your information, presentation style, slides must be more important and interesting to keep them focused on what you are talking about then what is going on at home, at work, with their children, financial concerns, etc. Adults learn through the use of their "Five Senses" and what percentage of the information: Seeing – 83%, Hearing – 11%, Smelling – 3.5%, Touching – 1.5%, Tasting – 1%

So what does this tell you about your teaching, presentation and training plans? Adults learn and remember information best, if the instructor uses these teaching techniques: 10% of what they read, 20% of what they hear, 30% of what they see, 50% of what they see and hear together, 70% of what they say or repeat, 90% of what they say while doing what they are talking about.

So again, what does this tell you about your teaching, presentation and training plans? Our presentations must incorporate this information and learning concepts to help adult learners learn and retain information. Other factors that can impact learning are the temperature of the room, the comfort of the chairs, are there tables being used, the lighting in the room, how many people are "squeezed" into the training room, how often are there breaks and times to stand up and walk and use the bathroom and other things. Think about the times you have sat in presentations at work and for fun and what did you like and what did you not like. Things that you did not like impacted your ability to learn and retain information. In the next issue, we look at presentation methods of instruction and power point slide shows. *Rich Mahaney, NCR Director*


